The department continued its growth in a number of areas over the past several months. For instance, we added 4 new faculty this fall. They join an impressive

group of faculty who were responsible for over \$800,000 in new grants. We also grew our undergraduate offerings with a degree in Behavioral Neuroscience, which is already proving popular.

Our graduate students continue to shine, including one who has brought the prestigious Ford Foundation Fellowship back to FSU for the first time in 10 years. Two of our graduate alumni won early career awards, and another received FSU's own Askew Young Alumni award. Neil received two recent awards. He was honored as a Grandmaster of the International Society for Gerontechnology, and he received the American Psychological Association Committee on Aging award for the Advancement of Psychology and Aging.

Paul Conway

Paul received the 2018 FSU Transformation Through Teaching award. This award honors faculty that have had an intellectual, inspirational, and integrative impact on the lives of their students.



Thomas Joiner

Thomas received three recent awards. He received the 2018 Alexander Gralnick Research Investigator Prize from the American Psychological Foundation for \$20,000. The purpose of this award is to support exceptional research and mentoring accomplishments in the area of serious mental illness. Thomas also received the Society for Military Psychology's 2018 Charles C. Gersoni Military Psychology Award for his work with the Military Suicide Research Consortium (MSRC). Additionally, Thomas received the 2018 Military Health System Research Symposium (MHSRS) Outstanding Research Accomplishment (Team/Academia) Award for his work with the MSRC.

Chris was named a Fellow of the American Psychological Association.

Rick Wagner

Rick was chosen as the 2018 recipient of the Samuel Torrey Orton Award, the International Dyslexia Association's highest honor. This award recognizes a person who has made vital contributions to the understanding and awareness of dyslexia, and has shown a high level of competence and dedication to the field.

New Faces

David Braithwaite

David (Developmental) received his PhD from Indiana University in 2014, and subsequently completed a postdoctoral fellowship at Carnegie Mellon University. The goals of his research are to understand how children learn to think mathematically, to identify personal and environmental factors that affect mathematics learning, and to develop ways of improving mathematics instruction. He employs a combination of descriptive empirical research, intervention studies, and computation modeling to pursue these goals.

Adam Dewan

Adam (Neuroscience) received his PhD from the University of Hawaii in 2010. His research focuses on the molecular and cellular basis of sensory perception. Using a combination of genetic, optogenetic, optical imaging, and behavioral techniques, his lab will explore how olfactory perception is mapped and encoded within the brain. Specifically, his research will initially focus on how the organization of the olfactory bulb shapes odor coding in higher brain regions and ultimately odor perception in mice.

Xiaobing Zhang

Xiaobing (Neuroscience) received his PhD from the University of Science and Technology of China in 2008. His research focuses on the neural circuits that control eating behavior and body weight. Using a variety of techniques, including optogenetics, electrophysiology, immunocytochemistry and virus-mediated circuit tracing, he seeks to understand how neural circuits for feeding and reward in the mammalian brain are merged to regulate eating behavior. The ultimate goal of his research is to elucidate

how the dysfunction in neural circuits causes eating disorders and obesity.

Amy Coren


Amy (Teaching Faculty) received her PhD in Cognitive Psychology from the University of Texas, Austin in 2007, and received her J.D. from the University of California, Berkeley School of Law in 2010. Dr. Coren was a Fulbright Fellow (2017-2018) to Hungary, where she engaged in teaching and research at the University of Pécs in Institute of Psychology. She is also a member of the Washington D.C. Bar Association and has provided pro bono legal services for indigent clients in the D.C. metro area. She is interested in the intersection of psychology and law - in particular applications related to judgment and decision making and forensic psychology. Dr. Coren will teach various undergraduate courses including Forensic Psychology (PSY 4930), Cognitive Psychology (EXP 3604), General Psychology (PSY 2012), and Research Methods (PSY 3213).

In the Spotlight

Neuroscience Degree



This fall, FSU rolled out a new Bachelor of Science degree in Neuroscience with two majors: Behavioral Neuroscience (in the Psychology department) and Cell and Molecular Neuroscience (in the Biology department). After just one semester, the Neuroscience degree has already reached 100 majors!

The creation of this degree was a collaborative effort spearheaded by **Frank Johnson** with significant contributions from psychology faculty including **Rob Contreras**, **Rick Hyson**, **Mike Kaschak**, **Alan Spector**, **Jeanette Taylor**, and **Zuoxin Wang**. Credit should also be given to the College of Arts & Sciences and FSU administration for their support of this degree and their assistance in its creation.



Ford Foundation Fellowship

Keanan Joyner (major professor: Chris Patrick) was one of 70 students nationwide to receive a 2018 Ford Foundation Predoctoral Fellowship. Keanan is the first FSU student in 10 years to receive the fellowship. The highly competitive fellowships are awarded by the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine on behalf of the Ford Foundation and include a \$24,000 stipend per year over three years. Through its fellowship programs, the Ford Foundation seeks to increase the diversity of the nation's college and university faculties by increasing their ethnic and racial diversity. Awards are given to students who have demonstrated superior academic achievement, are committed to a career in teaching and research at the college or university level and who look to use diversity as a resource to enrich the education of all students.

Three Minute Thesis

Two psychology students, **Bruno Chiurliza** (major professor: Thomas Joiner) and **Sarah Wood** (major professor: Rick Wagner) were selected as Finalists in FSU's Three Minute Thesis Competition. In this competition, students have three minutes to present a compelling oration on their dissertation topic and its significance. The goal is to force students to consolidate their ideas and crystalize their research discoveries. Thirtythree students competed; Bruno and Sarah were among the 14 selected as finalists. At the finalist competition on November 27, Bruno was awarded second place.





Kirsten Dillon, was awarded a 5-year Career Development Award from the Department of Veterans Affairs. Kirsten received her Ph.D. in 2015 in Clinical Psychology under the guidance of Jesse Cougle.

Eric Krause received the Alan N. Epstein Research Award, an early career award for discoveries that have advanced the field of ingestive behavior at the 2018 annual meeting for the Society of the Study of Ingestive Behavior. Eric received his Ph.D. in 2005 in Neuroscience under the guidance of Rob Contreras.

Callie Little won the Institute of Education Sciences (IES) Outstanding Predoctoral Fellow Award. Callie received her Ph.D. in 2016 in Developmental Psychology under the guidance of Sara Hart.

Jamie Quinn won the Rebecca L. Sandak Young Investigator Award from the Society for the Scientific Studies of Reading. Jamie received her Ph.D. in 2016 in Developmental Psychology under the guidance of Rick Wagner.


